So please, use good judgement, continue to prepare well for every aircraft and every flight, and you will achieve an exceptional, long and fulfilling career.

Speaking of fulfilling, how many of you give back by volunteering? Raise your hands if you you give back! Way to go! There is almost nothing more fulfilling that knowing that you have made a difference. Through Southwest Airlines, I have had the pleasure of helping build a wonderful program called the "Adopt-A-Pilot Program". Yes, I've been adopted several times by 5th grade classes. The program includes 4 or 5 visits to the classroom where the pilot helps bring the mathematics and geography the children have learned to an application level along with teaching some basic aerodynamics. Southwest provides books to each student and supplies the necessary supplies for some fun experiments related to Bernoulli's Principal. In addition, they supply a large wall map of all our destinations for the children to track the pilot's flights throughout the program. It's terrific to see the kids apply the math and geography they have learned, and help make STEM fun and interesting. Even with this great STEM experience, what makes this program so effective is the main focus of the Adopt-A-Pilot program...core values. We emphasize and practice our "FLIGHT" values: Fearlessness: to fearlessly chase your dream. Leadership: having positive, passionate and strong communication skills. Imagination: to be able to visualize yourself in in the role you dream of. Grateful: to appreciate and express it. Honesty: truly the only way to gain trust and respect of others. And last but not least, to have the Tenacity to never give up until you've reached your goal.

Fortunately, I've had the pleasure of witnessing these children's eyes light up with intrigue and excitement. Some children are just thrilled to have some attention, unfortunately many do not have parents that take the time to simply listen or to give guidance. If you can make a difference in just one child...is it worth it? Absolutely! A kinda funny story is, a couple years ago, on two separate occasions, I was walking through the PHX Airport in uniform when another pilot in uniform from a regional carrier approached me and said; are you a Captain Nancy? After I said yes, they exclaimed..OMG! You were my Adopt-A-Pilot in the 5th grade! I of course, said ...Yikes! I couldn't possibly be that old!
