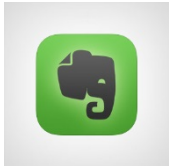

Evernote



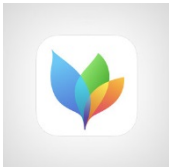
What is it?

Evernote lets you organize all your documents by tags, so you can easily search for them when you need them. MindNode



What is it?

Check out MindNode, an app that organizes your thoughts for you, so you can focus on that all-important idea generation. You start by writing down your thoughts into branching units called nodes, then connecting the dots to create a visual map of those ideas. Color-code the nodes to quickly identify similar themes. Drag and drop them into various patterns until a clear direction appears.

Dragon Dictation



What is it?

As a person is speaking, Dragon will transcribe the words for the person who is hard of hearing to read. This is a great free tool and works best in environments that are not overly noisy. Very similar Dragon apps are available for Android devices as well.

Tap Tap



What is it?

Tap Tap is a brilliant app that allows those with hearing loss to react to sounds. When it detects noise, the app will vibrate and flash to alert the user. If the door knocks, or someone is speaking or shouting, the user will know. If the smoke alarm goes off, Tap Tap will vibrate and flash. The sensitivity can be adjusted and the app can run in the background if desired, though this may use more battery power.

What is it?

Braci turns your smart device into a smart ear. By converting any type of sound from your environment, Braci can notify you by the power of visuals and vibrations. With the aid of the Pebble smartwatch, you can receive the notifications straight to your wrist; as well as your smart device.

Apps for the Blind and Visually Impaired

LookTel Money Reader



What is it?

The LookTel Money Reader recognizes US currency in standard denominations (\$1, \$2, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50, and \$100 bills) enabling blind and visually impaired people to quickly identify and count bills. Point the iPhone camera at any US bill and LookTel's object recognition technology via VoiceOver tells users the denomination in real time.

SayText



What is it?

SayText scans text within any image, such as a medical form, notes, or restaurant menu, and reads it aloud. Center the document under the iPhone camera and double-tap the "Take Picture" button. Then raise it slowly: a beep indicates that the entire document is in the phone's frame. The app's Optical Character Recognition utility then scans the text. Tap the screen for status updates. Once scanned, swipe right to hear the document read aloud.

Talking Calculator



What is it?

A comprehensively featured calculator that has become a favorite among adults and primary schools around the world. The Talking Calculator, an easy-to-read app calculator speaks button names, numbers, and answers aloud through a customizable built-in directory that lets users record their own voice. Button names are spoken as your finger moves over the screen. Double tapping a button enters the number onscreen. The calculator also has a high-contrast display mode to enhance visibility. Developer Adam Croser also makes the Talking Scientific Calculator app.
